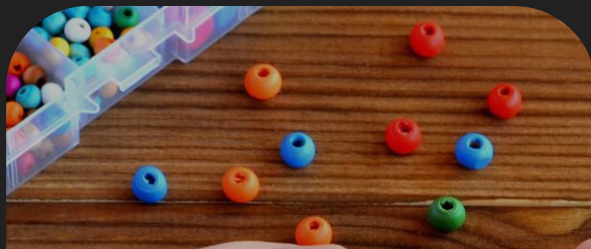

require the use of small muscle groups; need **control** and **precision**



- “a fight to brush teeth”

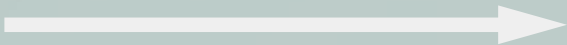
